Many opportunities are available for every student, such as leadership roles, student-led clubs and sports, a wide variety of subjects, offsite learning experiences (OLE's) and programs like the Duke of Edinburgh Awards. Students can be themselves and find like-minded peers.

International Mindedness

Our culturally-rich community includes 101 different cultural backgrounds from 67 different countries of birth and we host international students and study tours. We develop global citizens who understand the world from multiple perspectives, who develop their citizenship and who understand 'others with their differences can still be right'.

Harmony

The essence that makes our school a happy and calm place where students of all ages feel safe to express their personalities, seize opportunities beyond their comfort zone, learn from their mistakes and take risks with their learning.

21ST CENTURY TEACHING & LEARNING

Our teachers continuously improve their technology-based personalised learning through weekly professional development and listening to student feedback.

Working collaboratively, they target their teaching to student's learning needs, developing deep academic understandings and 21st Century skills known as the 5C's in **creative and critical thinking, collaboration, communication, citizenship** and **character**. These skills form the basis for innovation and entrepreneurial thinking.

Teachers practise active learning and students are coached to take responsibility for their learning in partnership with their teachers. Virtual learning environments (VLEs) support students working face-to-face, online and at home using their devices.

Students are becoming familiar with the elements that when practised together can be the building blocks of our 5C's - Creative and Critical Thinking, Collaboration, Communication, Citizenship and Character. They use them to track, monitor and reflect on their growth. This is a key part of the Glenunga Learner Journey which also requires students to identify their learning goals, seek support, and share their evidence-based achievements with their families and mentor teachers in the twice-yearly Learner Conferences.

LEARNER PROFILE

Since 2020 students have had access to their online Learner Profile, which enables students to see all their academic data and capabilities growth from year to year. This information enables students to set data-informed goals. From Year 7 to 12 students can monitor their progress, display achievements, document their contributions to school life, and capture their growth in their academic understanding and their 21st Century skills (5C's).

SPECIALIST PROGRAMS

The International Baccalaureate (IB) Diploma is an exciting, pre-university 2-year program taken in Years 11 and 12 that develops lifelong learners. Students develop high-level skills in critical thinking, strong peer-to-peer connections and a deep understanding and appreciation of international, cultural and social affairs.

The IGNITE program is designed for students with high intellectual potential, enabling them to reach their full potential in a context of similarly gifted peers. There is an annual assessment for Year 6 students looking to enter the program in Year 7.

LEARNING TECHNOLOGIES

Technology enables students to work at their own level of learning, access quality resources, work collaboratively and complete challenging assessment tasks relevant to the world beyond school. Teachers combine technology with best practice teaching to personalise learning for all students.

All students have a standardised device, configured to the school network and managed by IT Services. Purchasing a school laptop guarantees a fully maintained device with a long life battery and a software profile matched to the school's licensing arrangements.

STUDENT LEADERSHIP

Student Leadership is an important part of school life and a valuable contribution to the school community. We offer more than 200 formal and informal roles for students to grow their leadership skills across all year levels.

These opportunities enable students to become more confident individuals, dynamic leaders and supportive team members.

Prefects provide strategic leadership and advice to our school leaders.

Our three student-led Councils: 21st Century Learners, Wellbeing, and International Mindedness, provide leadership for our whole school improvement priorities.

House and Spirit Captains lead our four Houses in a range of activities. Student clubs and Sub Schools each have their own Captains and Vice Captains.



STUDENT WELLBEING

Our school is deeply committed to Holistic Education, where we nurture a young person's social, emotional, and psychological wellbeing. Positive wellbeing is the foundation for successful learning and engagement, as well as navigating experiences both at school and beyond. Students have access to support, strategies, opportunities, and explicit teaching to develop as 'well-beings'. Our Holistic Education program, LEAPPB, supports students to develop their wellbeing, their emotion regulation skills and their positive impact on others. Students also work in close partnership with their Mentor Teachers and subject teachers as they grow their understanding of themselves as a learner, a global citizen and a 'well being'.

The Wellbeing Team delivers individual counselling and Proactive Group Programs to support students with a range of aspects related to their emotional and social wellbeing. The Wellbeing Team provides a variety of resources to support students and their families when seeking further external assistance outside of school. They work in partnership with external health professionals supporting a young person's needs.

COMMUNITY

Families are encouraged to be active members of the school community. There is a highly skilled Governing Council, Finance Committee and Community Engagement Committee, which organises events and is a great way to meet other parents.

The student's Mentor Teacher who they are with for three years is the key contact between the family and the school, with Student Services providing a dedicated support for all school and student-based enquiries.

An online system called Daymap enables families to see student timetables, attendance, assessment schedules and grades in real time. If, at any time, there are concerns about a student, their family needs to immediately contact their subject teacher and/or Mentor Teacher.

School updates are shared with the family via email, the School Stream mobile app and Facebook.

Learner Conferences are an important opportunity for families to directly support their student's success at school. Led by students in partnership with their Mentor Teacher and family, there are two Conferences during the year. There are also Subject Teacher-Parent-Student Interviews and Futures-Focused Pathways Planning Conferences.
